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I. DESCRIPTION OF THE COURSE

“A study of neo-Darwinian principles for evolutionary biology; including aspects of natural history (macro-evolution) and population changes (micro-evolution) including problems in the neo-Darwinian paradigm and present various aspects of an Intelligent Design alternative.” (SES Catalog).

This course provides an overview of the broad cultural, intellectual, and scientific movement known as intelligent design (ID). It also critiques ID’s chief antagonist, the view that cosmological and biological origins are best explained as the result of an accidental evolutionary process.

II. ROLE OF THE CLASS IN PROGRAM OF STUDY

This class is an Apologetic or any area elective for all graduate degree students and is required for the graduate certificate in Scientific Apologetics.

III. OBJECTIVES: After completing the course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Defend Intelligent Design against evolutionary criticism.**
- 2. Explain how Intelligent Design fits into a Christian worldview.**

V. REQUIREMENTS FOR THE COURSE

All work must be typed or done a PC. Further, all papers must use Turabian, 7th ed., when appropriate documentation is required.

1. Before classes begin, read **DarwDay** and **LangGod** and watch two videos: *Inherit the Wind* (1960 version with Spencer Tracy) as well as Ben Stein's *Expelled: No Intelligence Allowed* (2008).
2. Also, before classes begin, try to get through as much of **DesLif** as you can.
3. The first third of classes will focus on **DesLif+MythJunk**, next third on **TDR**, and final third on **EndXty** (roughly).

4. Read **MindCosmos** to do critical review and read **UndstID** to do Sunday-school lesson plan.

VI. GRADING

1. Final exam in Moodle — 30 percent.
2. 1,500- to 2,000-word critical review of **MindCosmos** — 20 percent.
3. 3,000-word essay on the theological significance of intelligent design — 30 percent.
4. Develop Sunday-school lesson plan based on **UndstID** — 20 percent.
5. Regular class attendance and active class participation.
6. Single-page executive summary of YOU (with clearly recognizable picture of yourself).
7. All assignments and work must be uploaded in Moodle by the end date for the course: April 20, 2013.
